Keeping Scotia History Alive By Bob Hazelton

here is a significant part of our local history that has been hidden in the woods at Scotia. In recent years it has slowly been uncovered and explored. On August 1 of this past summer, we had a big leap forward in

revealing more of the history of Scotia. It was "Stewardship Day" at the local office of Baker Tilly. Baker Tilly is a world-wide advisory, tax and assurance firm with an annual event where they close the office and volunteer in the community for a day. They had contacted ClearWater Conservancy who in turn asked if I had a suitable project. That was an easy answer.

A few of us have worked at Scotia over the years and developed a wish list. The projects on this list were sizable and put off and onto the "maybe someday" list. So with Bryce Boyer, John Leslie and me plus 19 Baker Tilly volunteers, we tackled the list. We met at one of the pavilion tables at Circleville Park at 9 in the morning and after giving a brief history including sharing historic photos, we car pooled to a small parking lot along Range Road. After unloading our tools, we walked a short distance to the site where the 1890's era ore washer had been. The ore washer solved a major problem of iron ore embedded in clay at Scotia and many other area sites. It consisted of a trough set at an angle with 20 for

consisted of a trough set at an angle with 20 foot long logs with paddies attached. The embedded iron ore along with a constant flow of water and rotating the logs, pushed the washed ore out the top of the though. The remains of the three-story high ore washer building was were we started cutting the brush. We had cleared the site nine years ago

but not as thoroughly as the Baker Tilly group did.

When done, there was a 20 by 50-foot area that had been cleared and raked. In that area three of the cement slabs were exposed that were part of the massive base sup-

ports for the actual ore washer logs. In front of that was the foundation, which we theorized, was the wheel house for the cable drums that pulled the ore cars up the incline to the top of the three- story washer. Inspired by all that was accomplished by the Baker Tilly group, we have since discovered a portion of the wheel pits and verified its use. Plus, we have cleared all the brush between the site and Range Road. It's now impossible to drive by and not notice the site.

In the afternoon of the Baker Tilly volunteer visit, we moved to the WWII ore washer site and its massive concrete remains. The task was to clear the brush from between the receiving hopper remains and that of the washer. It was the path of the conveyor that transported the ore to the washer and therefore had rows of concrete bases for the timbers that supported the conveyor. It reveals so much of the site including the concrete supports that were previously hidden in the brush.



President's Corner

Then Ann Hettmansperger heard the bad news, she did what people often do when a loved one gets a bad diagnosis. She sought a second opinion. From an arborist. That's because the "patient" was a majestic 250-year old bur oak and one of Lemont's oldest living beings.

Ann is the owner of the Gallery Shop in Lemont. Before the village existed, the tree took root on the gentle slope between what is now known as Spring Creek and Pike Street. The tree escaped the farmers' plows and the axes of loggers who timbered much of the surrounding area to feed the iron furnaces.

On the afternoon before the tree was scheduled to be taken down due to a fatal fungus, a small group of Lemont villagers gathered under the bur oak to photograph it and share stories. There was talk of how the tree might live on in the art of local woodworkers or as a structural timber. There were laments for the loss of shade that the tree's dense canopy has provided. And there was sadness over the departure of one of Centre County's "witness trees."

The concept of a witness tree dates back to early settlements in the American colonies. As surveyors marked out parcels of land, they would document the trees that grew at imagined corners of a plot as a way of marking boundaries. The trees became silent witnesses to the legal division of property.

Today, a witness tree is generally considered to be one that existed at key moments in history or that has simply lived through

many eras of American life.

In 1987 the Centre County Historical Society chose a 275-year old white oak in Ferguson Township as a representative tree that was alive two centuries earlier when the U.S. Constitution was written. In his remarks at the recognition ceremony that day, Dr. Philip S. Klein, Penn State Professor Emeritus of History, noted that the tree was growing during William Penn's lifetime. He added:

"History is the memory of a society just as progress is its imagination of the future. Neither can exist safely without the other. This tree gives to us a sense of continuity, without which we cannot live.'

Five years later, the CCHS published *The Notable Trees of* Centre County which documented some of the county's oldest, largest, and most historically significant trees, including the American sycamore at the Centre Furnace Mansion.

From the recent gathering under the Lemont bur oak to the passions ignited by the decision last summer to develop part of Pine Hall Forest in Ferguson Township, Centre Countians' appreciation for their trees is apparent. That's why the CCHS is planning a new edition of *Notable Trees*. Please contact us if you would like to nominate a Centre County witness tree for inclusion in the book based on the tree's age, size, or association with Centre County history.

Think of it as a Witness Protection Program for our oldest and beloved sentinels.

Riches to Rags: Henry William Stiegel and his Glass Manufactory

enry William Stiegel emigrated from Cologne, Germany during pre-Revolutionary America and began work at Elizabeth Furnace near Berks County, PA. He eventually became an ironmaster and he purchased and renamed the furnace "Charming Forge." A highly successful glass making factory was then added.

Stiegel's glass work ranged from window panes to bottles and expanded to include clear and colored ornamental glass, often with hand painted designs and ornate etchings.

Stiegel's success unfortunately turned to financial ruin, and he spent several months in debtor's prison. Henry William Stiegel would be pleased to know that some of his work is now displayed in a number of museums, including the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

"Stiegel Glass" is difficult to positively attribute because the

work was not signed. Rags to Riches features beautiful examples of Stiegel type glass from ornately hand painted bottles to glasses that were made for popular period

beverages including Flip, Shrub and Syllabub.

Old House Fair on the Road Window Restoration Workshop Recap:

T xperts, including facilitator Ken Nuttle, agree ✓ that original windows not only contribute greatly to the appearance of historic

houses. Properly maintained original windows have a virtually unlimited service life and can be just as energy efficient or more than new replacement windows.

Pane, parting bead, sash cord, weight, glazing putty, muntin, jamb, sill, and stile are just a few of the words we learned to understand as Ken introduced us to the language and techniques of maintaining old windows.

A long time professional woodworker and teacher, Ken brought a unique background to this training. He worked at Colonial Williamsburg as a historic cabinetmaker and joiner, served as a Professor of Preservation Carpentry at the American College of the Building Arts in Charleston, SC, and was part of the restoration effort for Old Senate Chamber of the Maryland State House.

Ken led a group of ambitious old house homeowners during a day-long and hands-on September workshop at the Centre Furnace Mansion. He explained two ap-

proaches for repair of old and historic windows: "restoring" a window to what it was like when it was new, or "preserving" it to retain some of the window's history of wear. Participants attended because they have old houses and windows that need repair. The workshop was offered to give a better understanding of the process to do the work themselves or better communicate with a contractor.

Using one of the Mansion's windows, we learned how to remove sashes from the window frame and how to replace them. Ken walked us through the process of how to build and use a simple steam box and he demonstrated how long to steam in order to soften glaze and paint and how much working time is needed once you remove the sash from the steam box.

Techniques were shared about the kinds of products and tools needed for paint removal and how best to use them to safely remove old paint and glazing putty from the window so that glass panes could be carefully removed and then reinstalled and glazed.

EDUCATION & ADVOCACY

Helen Alters: Helen has been actively preserving history for decades. Among her many community contributions are publications she has written or edited including *Picturesque Bellefonte: An Era of Changes* and *Benner Township: 150 Years of Families, Forging, Farming, Fishing and Flying, Centre County, Pennsylvania.*

Jimmy Brown: Jimmy serves as the vice president and secretary of Hampton's Battery F, a non-profit organization devoted to portraying the life of the common soldier in the Union Artillery during the Civil War. Along with doing historical re-enactments, Jimmy makes presentations to schools, churches and community groups.

HISTORY AND HERITAGE

Luther Gette: Luther is the curator of the Philipsburg Historical Foundation which operates a museum bulging with artifacts from Philipsburg's past. He is also a driving force behind decades of preservation and downtown revitalization efforts in Philipsburg.

PRESERVATION AND RESTORATION

Laird Jones and Svitlana Budzhak-Jones: Laird and Svitlana have lovingly preserved and restored the Kocher House. It was designed by A. Lawrence Kocher who was one of the most prominent American architects of the early 20th century and a pioneering advocate of modern architecture.


